

LOVELOCK BEATEN BY WOODERSON IN A.A.A. MILE

TIME WELL ABOVE CHAMPION'S NORMAL

CHALLENGE FROM LAST BEND EASILY HELD OFF

A WOODERSON DOUBLE

MORE than 25,000 spectators saw Jack Lovelock, hero of the "Mile of a Century" race in the United States a week or two ago and witness the greatest mile race in the A.A.A. Championship ever held in England at White City today.

Lovelock led his race to R. C. Wooderson of Northwold, Harrow. The pair were under way when the former Public Schools champion, who at one time was 26 yards clear of the rest of the field, but Lovelock gradually closed up to him and at the three-quarter distance took the lead. But this was soon wrested from him by Wooderson, who kept just in front of Lovelock until the last bend.

Here Lovelock, who had run a mile six days ago, delivered a challenge, but Wooderson had run off and was by five yards in time, 17 5/8 sec, a time some way outside Lovelock's normal figure.

This is the second time that Wooderson has beaten Lovelock. At the start of the season he had to stop training through injury, and therefore his performance today was first class. He is not much more than 20 years of age.

Great Half Mile Final

There was a great race in the final of the half-mile. H. G. Townsend set out the pace almost from the start, but he soon fell away, and H. Scott, the Liverpool schoolboy from Northwold, took the lead and kept it until the last bend.

Here Stoddard, who had been keeping close up, wrested the lead from him and A. Powell also crept up to Scott's lead.

In a great race home Stoddard just withstood the challenge from Scott and won the race by a couple of feet in time, 12 1/2 sec. The third fastest time ever recorded in the A.A.A. championships.

Scott was just beaten for second place by Powell while Townsend did not finish.

Fifty-one runners braved the scorching hot day in the Marathon race, those including the holder, D. Michael Robertson.

Then while the heats of the 120-yard hurdles were being run off, and men like Frank Mitchell, Phipps and Mandak were qualifying for the final, we saw some fine pole vaulting by Galt, cleared 12ft. 7in. with about a foot to spare.

Six Left at Start

There were two false starts before the finalists in the 100 yards race, but then the holder, J. Sir, was not well off at the start. Sir was not well off at the start.

It was a great race between Swenson and Chandler, of Harford, and Bennett just won it by a foot in 15 1/8 sec, with Sir third half a yard behind Chandler.

The time was certainly not good for a field, but the bad start may have had something to do with it.

Manually there was some good vaulting, and after Brown had cleared 12ft. 6 in. he went on to jump 12ft. 10 in. and establish a new British record. The previous best was 12ft. 8 in. set up in 1923 by L. Barnes, also an American.
