

# Godin, Feller Pupil, Stops Nutmeggers; Harvard Cops

There were men on second and third, two outs and Harvard was behind 2-5 as the University of Connecticut was staging an their rally yesterday afternoon at Soldiers Field as Ira Godin went in to replace Wallace for the Crimson. Godin, who had been taught by Bob Feller, the Cleveland ace, during the war was every bit as cool as his teacher as he walked to the mound for the first time in a Harvard uniform and retired the batter.

An enthusiastic Crimson nine immediately rallied in its half of the fourth to tie the score. Ira continued to hurl came out the winner, 13-7, allowing three hits and two runs.

Harvard's big rally was the last of the seventh when six runs were scored when passes loaded the bases, and four consecutive singles, plus an error, followed. The visitors opened up in the first inning with a surprising four-run barrage, and Milt Dropp hit the longest blow of the afternoon—a tripple—off Godin in the eighth. The other two hits

allowed by the Harvard lad from Cleveland were both scratch singles.

Coach Dolph Samborski said that he was very pleased with Godin's performance. The boy is a cinch for future starting assignments. He was discovered by Feller when the famous fire-baller was managing the Great Lakes Naval Training Station baseball team. Godin hurled many games for Feller.

Most of the top foreigners are on the elderly side. The two Finns—Hietanen and Vaino Muinonen—are 36 and 44, respectively; Kyriakides is 37; Son is 34 and Nam, who ran third in the '36 Olympic race is 36. Koru, the Turk, is 34. But the character of the race is so topsy-turvy and fraught with mischance that each and all these cobblestone celebrities mentioned hitherto may be thwarted.

For example, the Korean delegation embraces Ki Chung Son, the Olympic champion; Seong Yong Nam, third in that great event, and Yun Bok Su, 24, a toothy little fellow who has never raced a step outside Korea. They are financed by G.I. Joes.

But the veteran Korean athletes say that Su, a sophomore at Korea University, could win the race if the switch from the dirt roads of his hilly homeland to the hard macadam of New England does not beat up his feet.

Kenneth H. H. Bailey of Bourne-mouth is the English representative, but not their best by any means. Christos Vartzakis is the third of the Greeks. Oswald Kis-
