

# Leandersson Takes Marathon With 500,000 Persons Lining Route

## SWEDISH CHAMPION FIRST BY 3 MINUTES

Leandersson, Fourth Straight Foreigner to Annex Boston Race, Timed in 2:31:50.8

## MILLROSE'S DYRGALL NEXT

White, Brooklyn Negro, Third —Kelley, Smith and Cote Then Follow in Order

BOSTON, April 19—Karl Gosta Leandersson, Sweden's 30-year-old champion, scored a runaway triumph in the fifty-third annual Boston Athletic Association marathon run today, as an estimated 500,000 spectators lined the route of what is described as America's greatest free sports spectacle.

Covering the 26-mile 385-yard course from suburban Hopkinton to Exeter Street in Boston's Back Bay section in 2 hours 31 minutes 50.8 seconds despite an aching Achilles tendon that slowed his pace over the last ten miles, the tall, slender Swede led his nearest pursuer in a starting field of 142 by nearly three minutes.

It marked the fourth straight year that a foreign entry won the Patriot's Day endurance classic so dear to the heart of the Hub. Runner-up in his first attempt at the full marathon route was Vic Dyrsgall, 28-year-old chain store accountant from New York's Millrose Athletic Association, this country's premier road runner at distances up to twenty miles last year. He was clocked in 2:34:42.

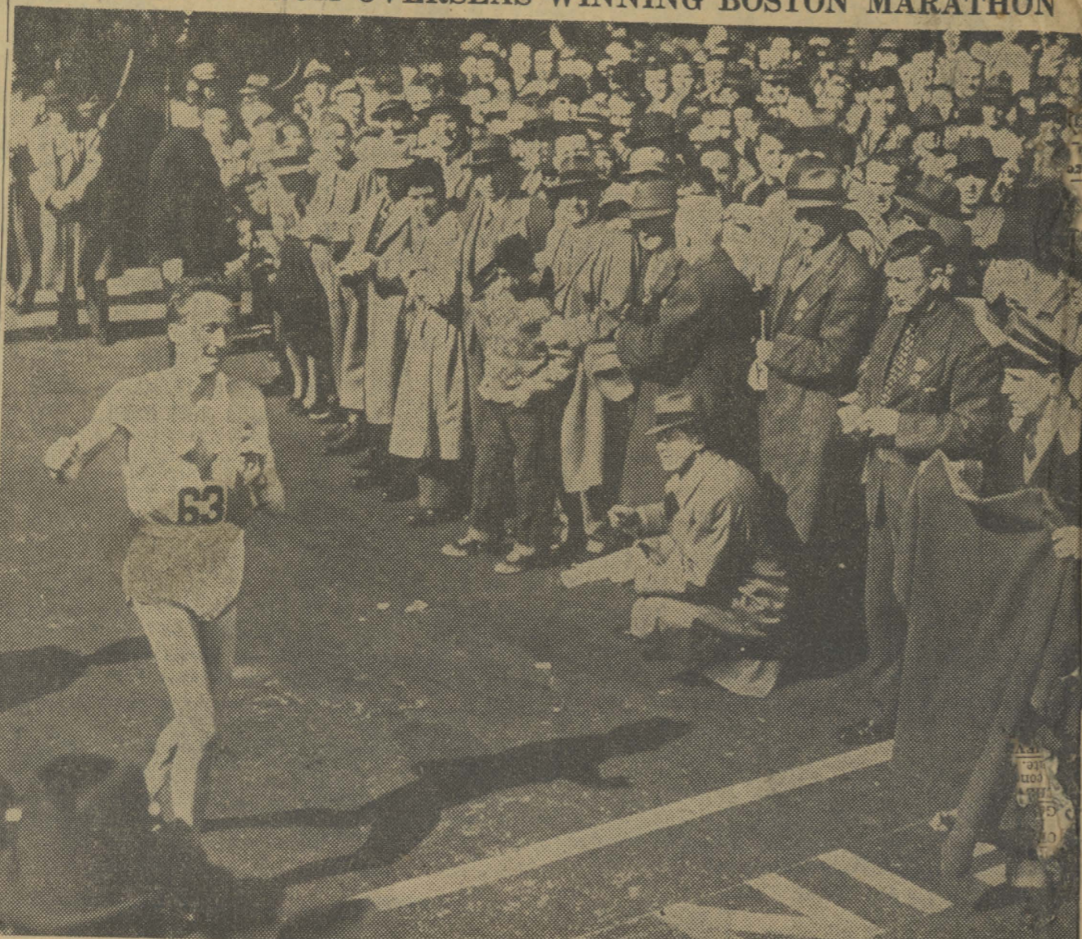
### White Stages Strong Finish

A surprising third, as many favorites fell by the wayside, was gritty Lou White, five-foot tall Brooklyn Negro who now sports the golden shirt and blue unicorn of the Boston A. A. He was timed in 2:36:48, after moving up strongly in the latter stages of the race. Three "name" entries, former winners all, were next in line. In fourth place was 41-year-old Johnny Kelley of the Boston Edison Employees Association, the National A. A. U. champion and a three-time Olympian who was the last American victor in this race in 1945.

Then came big Joe Smith, popular Medford milkman, whose time of 2:38:30 was far off the course record—since broken—of 2:26:51.8 he had set back in 1942.

A soundly beaten sixth, more than eleven minutes behind the leader, was jaunty Gerard Cote, French-Canadian special policeman from Ste. Hyacinthe, Que.,

## ROSSOLIMO CHECKS FRIEDMAN IN CHESS

Takes First Place Undisputed at Southsea—Tartakower and Pachman in Draw

Winning again in the sixth round, Nicholas Rossolimo, chess champion of France, took undisputed possession of the lead yesterday in the international masters chess tournament at Southsea, according to a report from London. Playing black, Rossolimo set up a Dutch defense against Dr. O. Friedman of London. The French expert took the initiative at an early stage and outcombined his opponent.

Dr. S. T. Tartakower, Polish master, and Ludek Pachman of Czechoslovakia, second and third in the standing, respectively, were paired together. Pachman played the Sicilian defense. The match was the most exciting of the round, both being pressed for time. They agreed to a draw after twenty-four moves when each had only ten minutes left on the clock.

## Princeton Defeats Columbia by 6-2 Behind Five-Hit Hurling of Reichel

Fairchild's Double Play Unassisted Nips Rally in 9th as Lions Lose in League Opener—Rakowski Extends Streak

Not far from where he kicked the field goal that gave Princeton a 16-14 football victory over Columbia last fall, Frank Reichel turned in an impressive performance in a pitcher's role as the Tigers defeated the Lions, 6 to 2, at Baker Field yesterday.

The defeat marked the first Ivy League contest for the Morning-side Heights aggregation after two non league victories and it was not until the ninth that the losers were able to convert any of their five hits into runs. Adam Rakowski continued his consecutive hitting record to his twenty-first game by lashing a single to center in the second.

But the Columbia adherents had to wait until Charlie Klemovich, the big catcher, knocked the ball over the fence into the Harlem for a home run, sending in Rakowski ahead of him in the ninth for Columbia's threatening gesture.

### Fairchild Clouts Homer

Shortstop Jim Fairchild, who earlier had sent a three-run homer into the river, nipped the Lion bid with a double play achieved unassisted.

Ed Coghlin, the third Columbia man to bat in the ninth went out on an infield tap to first. Tim Nicoli singled and Jerry Weil walked. Coach Andy Coakley sent in Don Lamond as a pinch-hitter for the third Columbia hurler, George Smith, but Lamond lined to Fairchild, who doubled Nicoli off second.

Except for that short flurry, Reichel had little to worry about with Princeton's errorless play backing him to the limit. The Tigers accounted for ten hits, including a double by Will Prior and the four-bagger by Fairchild as Columbia used three pitchers.

The Tigers, who lost to Navy in their only other Eastern league game and won four previous contests, scored in the second, fourth and seventh. One run came in the second on two hits, Marvin Skol-

Since Neidig and Collins, as well as Dyrgall, wore the Millrose A. A. colors, the Wanamaker organization made good on its promise to break the monopoly the Boston A. A. had held on team honors in its own event.

Blisters forced Lloyd Bairstow, one of the B. A. A. entries, to quit while running in close company with Dyrgall only three miles from home. Lloyd Evans of Montreal, rated high in pre-race estimates, also dropped out with leg trouble and cramps caused Jesse Van Zant, big Californian who had finished third a year ago, to limp home twenty-fourth.

As is the custom, the dense crowd at the finish held fast until 61-year-old Clarence DeMar dog-trotted across the line. The seventh-time winner, making his twenty-ninth start, was forty-ninth in 3:28:42.

A \$48-a-month caretaker at the Swedish mountain resort of Valadalen, who has won his national title twice but missed a shot at the 1948 Olympic crown because of a toe injury, Leandersson completely dominated the race.

Pouring on the pace in the early stages because of uncertainty as to whether his tendon, strained in a fall on the ice during the past winter, would stand up, the 5 foot 10 inch, 134-pound Swede passed Jones, the early leader, in Natick, just short of the ten-mile mark.

Already well in front of the other contenders, Leandersson kept widening the gap as the miles rolled under foot. By the time he entered the Newton Hills, it was apparent that only Dyrgall had a chance to catch him and Vic was nearly a half-mile behind then.

Although the steep grade known as Heartbreak Hill slowed the Swede's pace, which up to fifteen miles had established him as a threat to the 1947 record of 2:25:39 set by the absent Yun Bok Suh of Korea, no one was able to gain any ground. Leandersson continued to hold his margin on the last six miles of level ground, although he was in obvious distress.

To the delight of runners and spectators alike, the predicted rain and fog gave way to bright sunshine, and a pleasantly moderate westerly breeze shortly before the high noon start at Lucky Rock Manor. Conditions remained perfect through the day.
