The two fought a front-race duel all the way and they staged a thrilling match of sprints over the last two miles with Kyriakides finally winning the last and only sprint that really counted just a mile from the finish.

COTE THIRD

In his only previous outing in this marathon Kyriakides dropped out in 1938 when, after leading most of the way he quit at the 20-mile mark.

Third place went to Canada's Gerry Cote, winner of 1940, 1943 and 1944, with the time of 2:06.34. Fourth was won by Lou Gregory, New York schoolmaster, who led for the first 16 miles.

"I did my best for Greece," said the likeable Kyriakides immediately after the race. "And my best today was far better than I had ever hoped to do."

"You won for more than your country, me? You just should be killed for it," he said. "I'm going to tour the country seeking donations of food and clothing for my friends in Greece, the folks who paid to send me here on this mission."

Sixth place went to John Kersanson of the Millrose A. A., a bespectacled darkhorse who led for the first 12 miles. His time was 2:41.00. Seventh was Lloyd Evans of Montreal, fifth-place finisher for the past two years.

Kernason passed his teammate Gregory and enjoyed a 100-yard lead at 9.7 miles.

(The distance for the Natick mark was 9.7 miles and Kernason was timed through that point in 53m. 43s., more than two minutes behind the 51:36 of Smith in '42.

At 16.9 miles at the third checking station in Wellesley the 12.5 mile mark of the leader was still Kernason running beautifully as though he were out winning.

Gregory's time through fourth station at Woodland Park, the 16.9-mile mark, was 1:36:01.5, five full minutes behind Tarzan Brown's record for that station of 1:31:49.8, set in 1936.

Don Heinicke of Baltimore, who was the last runner to show up, brought news that a daughter had just been born to his wife. The baby, first for the Heinickes, was 5 pounds 12 ounces Jean Elaine.

Lee Faces Phils; Sanders on First

Raffensberger Opposes Braves In Philadelphia Opener Today

PHILADELPHIA, April 20—With Big Bill Lee, the bespectacled man who shackled the slugging Red Sox, as the pitcher and with the newly-acquired Ray Sanders playing first base, Boston's Braves help the Philadelphia Phillies open the National League season here today and hope to make it a very sad occasion for the Quaker City baseball enthusiasts.

LEE HERALDED AS MAN WHO STOPPED WILLIAMS The usual formalities—such as the parade to the flagpole, the raising of the flag, the playing of the national anthem and the throwing out of the first ball—were observed. Then Ken Raffensberger, a left-hander who came out of the service late last season, was Ben Chapman's choice to start throwing the ball at the Braves.

Lee, for instance, is being heralded as the man who shackled the Phils, or more Cooper, will draw the Red Sox and hence he's figured as the man of the hour, or two hours. For that matter, the Braves also figure that if Lee can give the Sox a merry twirling, then the Phils should be a soft touch.

And then there's the matter of Sanders. For the first time since he's been in organized baseball, he's in a uniform other than that owned by the St. Louis Cardinals system. He's making his first start for the Braves, and, of course, Philadelphia fans are referring to the Braves as the Easters with Johnny Hopp and Mort Cooper being on the roster.

Ray, who joined the Braves in Boston, made the trip over with the rest of the boys and got on right good terms with the other members of the Tribe he hadn't met socially.

BRAVES SEND SURKONTBACK, SELL M'CARTHY

PHILADELPHIA, April 20—Johnny McCarthy, the first baseman who was displaced by Ray Sanders and Matt Surkont, the Pawtucket pitcher who was acquired from the St. Louis Cardinals in the same Sanders deal, no longer are on the Braves payroll. Manager Billy Southworth this morning announced that McCarthy had been sold outright to the Minneapolis club of the American Association, while Surkont's bad elbow has caused his return to the Cardinals.

The departure of McCarthy was not unexpected, although the question was what the Braves would do with him, since he obviously had lost his speed. The exit of Surkont was surprising, although not in view of developments. He worked out with the Braves Thursday but then he complained that his arm hurt. He was sent to Dr. Harold G. Lee, who found chips in the elbow area.

With this information, the Braves called Sam Ewing, head of the Cardinals, who was astonished at the news. Moreover, he didn't hesitate one iota and said that the first thing the Braves should do was send him back. So Surkont is being shipped back to St. Louis where, presumably, he will undergo treatment at the Cardinals expense. In the meantime, Ewing and Southworth will try to agree on another pitcher.
