GREEK ARRIVES FOR MARATHON

Kyriakides Is Champion
in Own Country

Brings Laurel Wreath Here
for Winner April 19

Bronze of skin, wearing a reversible topcoat, his wavy jet locks bare to the weak rays of the April sun, he might have been a California collegian come East for the holidays.

But he wasn't. He was Stylianos (Stanley) Kyriakides, 28-year-old Athenian. Marathon champion of Greece, who completed a 5000-mile journey to the Boston Marathon when he reached the South Station from New York yesterday afternoon.

Five thousand miles is a long trip to win a wreath of laurel, the leaves of which were picked on your own Athenian hills, but Stylianos not only is here for that purpose, but brought the wreath with him for the Greek Athletic Association.
