



At left the sensationally dramatic finish of the Olympic Marathon Race in London in 1948. The photograph shows the road outside—Wembley Stadium. The Belgian, Gaillie, is in front (3), followed by the Argentinian, Delfo Cambrera (1), the Englishman, Tom Richards (2) and the South African, Z.L. Coleman. But a few moments later a hundred thousand spectators in the Wembley Stadium watched with bated breath the drama of the Belgian—completely exhausted—lose not only the first, but also the second place. The numbers in the photograph show the final placing of the runners.
