## Plymouth, Quincy Leaders Seek North Shore Support

Plymouth High and the two big Quincy schools, Quincy High and North, not only have official sailing teams, but they're looking for competition from the likes of each sea-view schools as Gloucester, Marblehead, Swampscott, Hingham, Fairhaven, the Cape schools, and any others which might like to duplicate a good idea.

### QUINCY, PLYMOUTH PLAN COMPETITION

Plymouth and the Quincoys have plans for competition among themselves and against teams from other schools by sailing in their programs. But they'd like more opposition.

# Kyriakides Set to Start Tour for Aid to Greece

The first step in his mission accomplished when he charged past Johnny Kelley like dawn chasing darkness into Stylianos Saturday afternoon, Stylianos Kyriakides, the newly crowned king of the marathons, is now bending all his efforts to the main task of obtaining food, clothing and possibly athletic equipment for his destitute Grecian countrymen.

### BIG JOB IS SEEKING AID FOR GREECE

"The Germans, Bulgarians and Italians plow Greece clean during the occupation," said Kyriakides. "They took everything, the wheat, the grain, the animals, the trains. There is nothing left. We need not only shipments of food and clothing right now, but we need also seeds of all sorts that we can produce our own food supplies.

This week I am going to New York and out about the shipment of 6500 pair of shoes, 1000 cases of canned sweet milk, about 100 suits, and refrigeration units, that have been ordered by my company (the Greek electrical company for which he is bill collector). After that I intend to make as many appearances as I can urging the Greek-Americans and the American people to do as much as they can for my country."

### APPEARANCE TONIGHT

First on his ambitious program is an informal reception and dance tonight at the Ritz Plaza on Huntington Avenue, the funds of which will go to Greek Relief. This will be followed by appearance April 20 before the V. F. W. also at the Ritz Plaza, when George Demeter, his
