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## TRUMAN BARS TAX CUTS NOT DESPITE SURPLUS IN BUDGET

### Korean Su Shakes Off Spill To Shatter Marathon Record

*Wins in 2:25:39,  
Beating Haitanen  
By Two-Thirds Mile*

Yun Bok Su, proxy for thousands of homesick American soldiers in far-off Korea, repaid his financial benefactors yesterday by fleeing over the famed B. A. A. marathon course in 2 hours, 25 minutes, 39 seconds, fastest time in history by more than a minute.

The 24-year-old sophomore from the University of Korea, proudly wearing a United States shield on his jersey beside the coat of arms of his native land, scorched the last 10 miles of the course to win by two-thirds of a mile over Mikko Hietanen, 35-year-old stock clerk from Finland.

#### Cosmopolitan Finish

Supported by the contributions of occupation troops in bleak Asiatic territory and flown halfway around the world in Army aircraft, Su responded with a triumph second only to victory in the Olympic marathon itself. It certainly was the greatest of all 51 B. A. A. events.

Simple proof lies in the cosmopolitan character of the first 10 finishers: a Korean, two Finns, two Canadians, two Greeks, two Americans, and a Turk.

#### Vogel Strategy Fails

Top American to finish was boyish Ted Vogel, the Tufts student who was a great third in 2:30.10, only 31 seconds behind Hietanen. Ted might well have been second, but his preconceived strategy of staying with the defending Stylianos Kyriakides proved disastrous.

Fourth was strutting Gerry Cote of St. Hyacinthe, P. Q., thrice winner of this Patriots' Day classic, who manfully survived two racking spells of nausea while he was still in the contention in the middle stages. A countryman from Ontario, handsome Ab Morton, repeated his fifth-place performance of last year.
